Hello Tree Lovers!

Tis our busy season and I don't mean the holidays. Tree giveaways, tree plantings and tree stewarding are in full swing from November through January and your ACFT is geared up for all of it.

Read below – and fast! – to catch our first tree giveaway this fall. Expanding our regional impact in partnership with International Paper, via the Arbor Day Foundation, we'll be in Riegelwood this Saturday, November 2, from 9 until Noon.

The following weekend, November 10, we're partnering with Audi Cape Fear and Plastic Ocean Project on a tree planting at the county landfill, where trees add much to ground stabilization, habitat restoration and carbon sequestration.

We've also completed our second class of Tree Stewards assuring our newly planted trees a team of knowledgeable and attentive caretakers.

And, our Advocacy Team is impressively flexing its muscle: weighing in on the City's Technical Standards, which guide construction and development in our city; keeping an eye on and preparing informed responses for rezoning requests; and planning our ACFT Community Meeting in January so everyone feels empowered to protect (what's left of!) our canopy.

Free Tree Giveaway this Saturday (11/2)

We'll be planting 75 oaks at an idyllic reclamation site along a pond at the NHC Landfill dubbed the "Fearless Forest". We are also doing this project in conjunction with our long-time partners the Plastic Ocean Project.

Williston Oaks Project





The Alliance is working with the Williston Alumni Association,

Penderlea Farms, and Matt Sullivan's AIG students at Williston Middle School on the Williston Oaks Project. These majestic oaks were planted around the time of construction of the two historic Williston High School buildings.

On October 17th, we kicked off the project. Sonja Green, a Williston High School Alumni and Alliance Board member, spoke about the significant history of the school that these trees witnessed. Then the students harvested the acorns, which Penderlea Farms will raise into saplings, to be eventually given away to the surrounding community in a year or two!

Advocacy Committee update

By the time you read this, we will have submitted recommendations to the City of Wilmington to improve their Technical Standards Manual. The Manual is currently being updated to keep the City current with industry technologies, materials, and practices. The Manual provides detailed guidance to the development industry on how to implement the requirements of the Land Development Code. This includes design details for new infrastructure, such as streets, sidewalks, multi-use paths, street lighting, street trees, landscaping, etc. The Alliance hopes our recommendations - to encourage low impact development, preserve existing trees over new plantings, and utilize green infrastructure for stormwater management whenever possible - will be incorporated into the Manual. Looking ahead to 2025, the Alliance will host a free Community Meeting on Wednesday, January 15, 6:00-7:30PM at the New Hanover County Arboretum. This is ACFT's campaign to shift urban landscaping from an uninformed reliance on grass and invasives to intentional use of native plants and trees. Native trees are the keystone plant in a sustainable landscape, providing native pollinators with adequate food and habitat, diminishing use of pesticides and irrigation, and sustaining biodiversity and a thriving ecosystem.

According to the National Weather Service, Wilmington received .13" of rain last month versus the October average of 4.56".



October's average temperature was 66.3 degrees

versus the average of 66 degrees. However, looking forward, the first week in November will be warmer than usual with highs in the upper 70s (versus the average November high of 66.9).

So even though we received a lot of rain in September, we essentailly received no rain in October, and the first few weeks of November are forecast to be hotter than usual, so its likely your favorite tree is very thirsty. Please water!
